The customary Board meeting was held on the afternoon of the opening day, and was followed by a delicious buffet dinner honoring State Officers at the home of Mrs. Phil Porter.

An impressive Massing of the Colors by the Highland Park High School R.O.T.C. officially opened the first business session on April 12th, with welcoming speeches made by Mrs. Robert Dooley, State Second Associate, Mr. John Leedom, Dallas City Councilman, and a response by Mrs. Albert Davis of Austin, former State Director. Greetings from the Alliance were extended by Mrs. R.R. Guerra, newly-elected Director-General. ... Following a business session of reports by members of the State Board, the meeting adjourned to allow delegates to attend a "Chuck Wagon Luncheon", hosted by Table I in the South Ballroom of the Inn. The Lovett Family of Dallas presented a delightful program of Country Western singing. ... The afternoon business meeting was devoted to further reports and recommendations of the State Board of Directors, with adjournment at 4:30 P.M. Guests assembled at 6:00 P.M. to be driven by private cars to the Country Dinner Playhouse, where they enjoyed a buffet dinner and saw a delightful comedy "Move Over, Mrs. Markham" starring Cyd Charisse. This event was likewise hosted by Table I.

The business meeting on Wednesday, April 13th convened at 9:00 A.M. and continued with the very interesting reports of Table Directors throughout the State. Adjournment was called at 10:30 A.M. to allow delegates and guests to participate in a scenic tour of Dallas. New Table Formed In Odessa

"Having been a member and Director of the Pan American Round Table III in Dallas, I had enjoyed Pan Americanism, and had been to several Texas and Alliance Conventions. So after moving to Odessa, I missed that association and was interested in the possibility of starting a Table there.

Bea Dooley, Second Associate Director of the Texas Tables, learned of my interest, and gave me the State Bylaws, purpose, credo, and other material to use. Also, Table III of Dallas lent me scrapbooks and material to display and show.

I had inquired at different organizations, of which I am a member, for interested persons to come to an organizational meeting at my house. And on March 21, 1977 the Pan American Round Table of Odessa was formed, with fourteen members, most of whom are from Texas, but also Argentina, Colombia, and Mexico.

We held our second meeting on April 4, and now have eighteen members. We have elected officers, approved our ByLaws, and plan to have as projects a scholarship for a Latin American student in an area college, Spanish classes, Spanish-speaking teas, and entertaining and escorting of Latin American students and visitors.

Now our immediate goal is to acquire twenty-two members in order to be also a member of the Alliance."
